I am sad to report that effective May 2016, Gwen will be stepping down from her role of Executive Coordinator after eight years of faithful service. ### From Our Executive Coordinator



As each new year begins, we are can be assured of two things. First, we are 100% committed to continuing to provide a 4-day supply of food to people in our area, who need it - and there are always people who need it. Second, we can be 100% certain that each year will bring challenges and changes but we never know what they will be. The year 2015 was certainly no exception and we saw changes. 

### **Client Success Story**

Jenny (name and some details have been changed) found herself a single mom and student, left on her own from a relationship gone wrong trying to figure out where to find diapers for her baby for the next day. She was referred to us by the Resource Centre for help with food and diapers. After using our program for a time, her circumstances changed, she had a job and a growing family and did not need extra help anymore.

She has remained very committed to playing an active part in her community and to making a difference in the lives of people who are in need just as she was. One of the things that she does every year is to hold a diaper drive in the Spring, where she collects diapers for us to use when distributing monthly food and toiletries. This has become a very big event and we receive thousands of dollars worth of diapers of all sizes.

In April, she found out that we were low on diapers one Monday evening, so she jumped in her vehicle, pyjamas and all, and made an early, partial delivery of some of the diaper sizes that we needed that night. The rest of her delivery came later that week! Thanks!

### **Elected Representatives**

We would like to express appreciation to our elected representatives for their efforts on our behalf in 2015.

Councilor Tim Tierney of Ward 11 Beacon Hill - Cyrville invited us to be one of the beneficiaries of his fourth annual 'Celebrate Summer' which was a very successful event, gratefully receiving over \$2000. Whenever we need help with anything, we call on Councillor Tierney's office.

\*Though no longer our federal MP, Royal Galipeau was a regular supporter, ensuring we received our Canada Summer Jobs grant and once again, honoured one of our volunteers, Pat Gregoire, for her many years of service in the community, at his Annual Hearts of Gold Volunteer event. We look forward to a similar relationship with our new MP Maril Belanger, wishing him well through his recent health challenges.

### **Government Funding**

The GEFC receives an annual funding grant from the City of Ottawa, which in 2015 was \$45,821. We are also grateful to the City for the efficient and prompt support and care of our physical building and the fact that we do not have to pay rent or utilities. That support is vital to our program! We received a new rear delivery door and new paving to our rear delivery door in 2015.

We received a federal job subsidy from Canada Summer Jobs to offset the cost of hiring a university student for the summer. This enabled us to hire our student, Maegan Gordon, for 14 weeks from May through August.

### **Cooperative Efforts**

#### 1. Ottawa Food Bank

We receive approx. 25% of our food for distribution through the **Ottawa Food Bank**. We are thankful for this cooperative relationship and are proud to be one of their member agencies. They provide invaluable support and through them we are able to have access to products that would be more difficult for us to access as an individual food program.

Each March we also participate in Hunger Count, where statistics are collected from food programs across Canada and then compiled into one document that can be found on the web - just search for Hunger Count 2015. We also proudly participate in educational events and sharing of best practices with other member agencies across the City.

#### 2. Parade of Lights

We would like to thank the Parade of Lights organizers (the Ottawa Firefighters Assoc.) for organizing the annual Parade of Lights. We were a part of the Nerds On Site float in the parade handing out candy and allowing us to have exposure, in our community, to over 150,000 people.

#### 3. Jardins Arrowsmith Gardens

This community garden is located right beside the Food Cupboard building. The gardens are organized and run by a separate Board of directors but clients of the Food Cupboard are given priority to grow a plot for a very minimal cost. We also receive produce from two of the plots and extra produce from the plots of each of the gardeners.

#### 4. Other Programs

Throughout the course of the year we have worked cooperatively with a number of other programs referring clients for services through the Eastern Ottawa Resource Centre (one of their intake workers spends Friday mornings at our location), the Snowsuit Fund, the Caring and Sharing Exchange (formerly Christmas Exchange), , the City of Ottawa Public Health Department, the Salvation Army, Helping with Furniture, and other local food agencies when clients have come to us from out of our geographic area. We also receive extra donations of popular, non-perishable food items from the Orleans-Cumberland Food Program which is a great asset to our food distribution.

### **Fundraising**

A number of fundraising activities took place in 2015

- 1. The autumn Direct Appeal Campaign, which targets previous donors, was our largest fundraiser, as it is every year.
- 2. Our general letter campaign was distributed, this year, through a flyer distribution company which targeted households within our catchment area.
- 3. Third Party fundraisers Various groups and individuals hold individual food drives and fundraisers that also benefit us, greatly, both monetarily and with food donations. These are outlined in the previous pages. We are actively involved in these fundraisers by attending, providing extra volunteer support, speaking at events representing the Food Cupboard, and picking up donations and food that have been collected.

### **Volunteers**

Our volunteers are the backbone of our organization. We would not function without the countless hours that are contributed to make our program work. The range of tasks that are completed is extensive and often changes. Whatever the task or responsibility, someone can always be found who is willing to take it on. One of the strengths from our volunteers is the sense of ownership they take with their responsibilities. The job gets done and gets done well! We has 13 volunteers leave in 2015, many who had been with us for a long time. We miss them! We also had 20 new volunteers added to our roster bringing with them new energy and enthusiasm. We welcome them!

We maintain a waiting list for those who would like to volunteer and the current wait time continues to be about a year. When a need for extra help arises, our volunteers are there. It is a privilege to work with those who are so committed!!

## **Initiatives and Changes**

Over the past year, we have moved forward with some other initiatives such as:

- 1. Link2Feed Client database Our client information, visits and statistics are now collected on this online database format, making it easier to collect data, make reports and share statistics with other food bank agencies across Canada, while still maintaining total client confidentiality for anyone who walks through our doors.
- 2. We now provide Halal meat (either chicken or ground beef) as one of our protein options, along with all of our regular options and are thankful for our meat suppliers for giving us great deals on pricing.
- 3. We have added 2 new freezers to replace our older freezers that had either stopped working or on their last legs.
- 4. We will be transitioning to a new donor management systems which will help us to better be able to manage our donors, and issue tax receipts quickly and more easily by e-mail.
